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» Debt Crisis in Europe: What to expect in 2012?

On December 23, 2011 CADTM Belgium, ATTAC Brussels 2 and ATTAC Liege, represented by their lawyers Pierre Olivier and Robert Stein, implemented proceedings against the Belgian Council of State to cancel the Royal Decree of 18 October 2011 that granted a State guarantee of certain loans to Dexia SA and Dexia Credit Local SA. 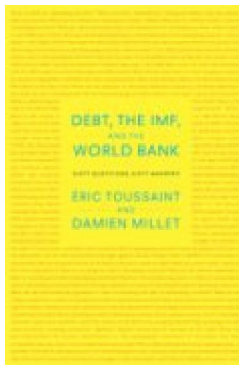
